HAPPY TAILS: ZUKE

This month, we are sharing the stories of two very lucky little kitties whose lives would have been painful and short without the attention and help they received.

About two months ago, "Zuke," a four-month-old fellow at the time, was discovered alone in the countryside with a very sore paw by a friend of Emili, who is now Zuke's mom. Realizing that Zuke needed medical treatment, Emili—a self-described "real animal lover"—decided to give Zuke his forever home. Taking on the responsibility of getting the necessary medical care, she took him to a veterinarian, where he was diagnosed with an abscess in his paw. Medication was administered, and the abscess was drained.

The paw appeared to improve, and Zuke began to feel better, but not for long. Once again, Emili took poor Zuke to the veterinarian so the paw could be drained. Emili was even given instructions on how to perform this procedure at home.

Unfortunately, the paw was still not improving, so Emili decided to take Zuke to a different veterinary clinic, Oak Knoll in Moline. There, it was determined that the infection had reached the bone, and amputation would be required to save Zuke's life. At this point, Rescued was contacted to help with the costs of Zuke's medical care. Emili had been able to raise a large part of the total costs—\$860, including neutering—by reaching out to friends and contacts, and Rescued covered the remaining balance of \$120.

Following the surgery, Zuke—named by Emili's daughter and short for Zucchini—was confined to a bedroom for three weeks to allow for healing. Now, even after losing a complete leg and shoulder blade, Emili states, "Zuke is not intimidated by our other cat or our two dogs! Everyone gets along really well."







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HAPPY TAILS: HANK

Our second featured fellow is Hank, a big yellow male who was rescued from a ten-cat hoarding situation in September. He and two other rescued kitties were placed in a foster home, where it was noticed that one of Hank's eyes was watering and injured. A trip to a veterinarian revealed a scratched cornea, and medication was administered.



Hank was scheduled for neutering at QCAWC (Quad Cities Animal Welfare Center). About a week before his surgery, he began hiding and coughing. It was determined that Hank's neutering needed to be postponed and he needed to be seen by a full-service veterinary clinic. Hank was taken to Precious Paws Veterinary Hospital in Bettendorf, where he was diagnosed as being very sick from anemia and close to needing a blood transfusion. The cause of his illness was mycoplasma, a disease that causes respiratory ailments and destruction of red blood cells, leading to anemia and death without treatment. Hank was put on a course of antibiotics, and remained at the clinic for one week while his blood was tested regularly.



One month after his removal from the hoarding situation, Hank's eye has healed nicely, he has recovered from the mycoplasma infection, and was finally well enough for his neutering. And the best part of all: Hank's foster home has become his forever home! "Hank loves to be held and cuddled, loves his food, and loves to chase leaves," says his new mom.

It took quite a few concerned and dedicated people to turn Hank's life around. There was Jordan, who works regularly with helping local cat colonies and is now Hank's new mom. There was Emily, who also takes on the responsibility of helping cat colonies and coordinated the numerous volunteers to transport Hank to his veterinary appointments. She was also able to secure the funds needed for Hank's eye care and neutering, which totaled \$200, through King's Harvest and individual donations that support TNR (Trap, Neuter, Return). There was QCAWC and the medical care provided by Precious Paws. And of course, there was Rescued, which covered \$650 of the medical costs for Hank's illness.

These two stories demonstrate how stray cat and overburdened cat situations don't always have to end on an unhappy note. The concern and love of individuals like Emili, who step up to offer their home to that one animal who is homeless, can mean so much to that animal. It also takes the caring and dedication of special people like Jordan and Emily, who are consistently involved with homeless cats through TNR. Rescued is proud to be able to help with the ever-increasing costs of medical care for sick or injured animals. You, our supporters, have made that help available and hopefully will continue to do so for many years to come.
